Numerous Public Opinion Surveys Consistently Show Americans Strongly Oppose Additional Medicare Cuts

- If the president and Congress decide to reduce the deficit by reducing spending on federal programs and services, in which programs you would be willing to see spending reduced? (responses on Medicare spending):
 - Major reductions: 10%
 - Minor reductions: 31%
 - No reductions: 58% (66% of Democrats; 50% of Republicans)

Strongly oppose	58%	64%	53%	53%
